ODPP unveils first-ever Strategic Plan

In a momentous occasion marking a new chapter in its 55-year history, the Office of the Director of Public Prosecutions (ODPP) proudly unveiled its first-ever strategic plan for 2025 to 2030.

Speaking at the launch of the Strategic Plan, the Acting Director of Public Prosecutions, Ms Nancy Tikoisuva emphasised the significance of this milestone, stating, “If nothing changes, nothing changes.”

The Strategic Plan serves as a critical blueprint for the future goals of the ODPP which outlines the organisation’s clear path forward, detailing short, medium and long-term goals for the next five years.

Ms Tikoisuva said, “The strategic plan is more than just a road map - it is a comprehensive framework that highlights the organisations key priorities for growth, development and transformation. These priorities aim to strengthen ODPP’s core functions and ensure its continuous improvement, responding to the changing needs of the justice system while fostering accountability, transparency and efficiency.”

The Strategic Plan launch was followed by a discussion session between the senior management and divisional teams on the key strategic priorities and charting the course of action for the next five years.
