OUR MANDATE

- 1. Institute and conduct criminal proceedings.
- 2. Take over criminal proceedings that have been instituted by another person or authority (except proceedings instituted by the Fiji Independent Commission Against Corruption);
- 3. Discontinue, at any stage before judgment is delivered, criminal proceedings instituted or conducted by the Director of Public Prosecutions or another person or authority (except proceedings instituted or conducted by the Fiji Independent Commission Against Corruption), and
- 4. Intervene in proceedings that raise a question of public interest that may affect the conduct of criminal proceedings or criminal investigations.
- 5. The ODPP derives its mandate from the 2013 Constitution and is responsible for the prosecution of all criminal cases under the laws of Fiji. In particular, the core legislation that the ODPP is guided by on its daily functions are as follows:
 - Crimes Act 2009
 - Criminal Procedure Act 2009
 - Sentencing and Penalties Act 2009
 - ♦ Proceeds of Crime Act

Our Office

The Office of the Director of Public Prosecutions (ODPP) handles a wide range of criminal law matters, from straightforward cases to highly complex ones, covering an extensive spectrum of legal areas. The main office, located in Suva, houses specialized units, while the outer divisions are serviced by various Divisional Offices across Fiji.

- ◆ At the Suva headquarters, the General Crimes Division (GCD) is the largest division. It is responsible for prosecuting offences that do not fall under "fraud offences" or "child -sensitive offences." These include crimes against public order, international order, and the administration of lawful authority; sexual offences; prostitution; abortion; offences against the person (such as murder, manslaughter, and infanticide); crimes against humanity; offences endangering life and health; criminal recklessness and negligence; and offences against a person's liberty, among others.
- The Sexual Crimes Division (SCD) is a specialized unit within the ODPP dedicated to prosecuting cases of sexual and gender-based violence (SGBV), child sexual abuse (CSA), and other crimes where children are victims. The SCD collaborates closely with the Fiji Police Force and key stakeholders such as the Department of Social Welfare and Empower Pacific to address matters involving child victims comprehensively.
- The Serious Fraud Division (SFD) focuses on prosecuting major fraud cases and money laundering offences. This division also handles the initiation of restraint and forfeiture applications under the Proceeds of Crimes Act, which is a civil process. With the support of the National Anti-Money Laundering Council, the ODPP manages the Forfeited Assets Fund, which maintains proceeds from forfeited assets.



Our Office

The Divisional Officers across Fiji serve their respective areas in all matters of criminal law and coordinate with the specialized units in Suva for support on specific cases. This structure ensures that the ODPP can effectively address the diverse legal needs throughout the country.

The diverse areas of legal practice within the ODPP also provide opportunities for prosecutors to conduct appeals in higher courts in Fiji. The increased access to justice through the appeal courts has significantly impacted the ODPP's caseload, leading to the creation of the Appeals Division in Suva. This division focuses on appellate advocacy in higher courts such as the Court of Appeal and the Supreme Court.

Recognizing the need for more resources and prosecutors, the ODPP has benchmarked its requirements against the expansion and presence of courts across Fiji, as well as the growth of the Legal Aid Commission. Additionally, the ODPP conducts Basic and Advanced Prosecution courses for the Fiji Police Force and other law enforcement agencies and stakeholders. The support from the Fiji Police Force's Prosecutions Department in mitigating the ODPP's workload is acknowledged, and the training provided is beneficial in supporting the ODPP's core functions.

PRIORITY 1: Effective and Efficient Prosecution Services

We understand our primary prosecutorial role has significant impact on the public confidence in the rule of law. In order to be efficient and effective in this role, we need to enhance the capability, capacity and processes of the office. This will require significant focus on:

- Optimized use of digital platforms
- Improving **infrastructure** and resourcing of the ODPP
- Improving internal processes
- Risk assessment and management approach in resourcing
- **Safety and Security** of Prosecutors and the prosecution offices
- Strategic and Succession planning and implementing measures to support staff
- **Communication Policy** that will provide guidance on media releases related to public interest cases and processes under the criminal justice system.





PRIORITY 2: Stakeholder Engagement and Collaboration

The success and efficiency of our prosecutorial role is reliant on the trusted relationship between our institution with key national law enforcement institutions and international bodies. We also contribute to nation building through law review, statistical data of criminal matters, capacity building and training. Our strategic priority is to:

- Strengthen **communication** with key national law enforcement institutions
- Strengthen our **processes** and develop a **special unit** to respond to international and national requests for assistance in criminal matters
- Improve on its **CLE sessions** and communication with Board of Legal Education
- Contribute towards the development of terms of references for our **engagement** and **participation** in national committees, sub-committees or any form of engagement.





Development 3: Training and Development

Criminal trends or mode of criminal activities are always evolving with time; hence we need to ensure that our prosecutors are continuously equipped and trained to effectively prosecute emerging criminal matters. This includes any training relevant to changes to the laws in Fiji and the rules of practise evolving from common law countries. Our office has also evolved in its organisational structure with specialised areas of prosecution such as the Serious Fraud Division the Sexual Crimes Division and the General Crimes Division that will require specialised training for its staff.

Our focus will be on:

- Developing and improving on the training needs analysis for professional and support staff;
- **Monitoring and evaluating** all training undertaken by the ODPP in order to optimise our skills in specialized areas.
- Review and improve the **curriculum** for current training programs with law enforcement institutions.
- Review our **Training Policy**.





PRIORITY 4: Victim and Witness Support

A key factor in delivering a fair prosecution is the support towards victims and witnesses who attend court to give evidence. We recognise that the unique geographical and socioeconomic dynamics of our society can impede on a victim and witnesses' ability to attend court when summoned. Hence, our final strategic priority is to:

- Develop a Financial policy for the processing and disbursement of witness allowance.
- Optimize staff allocation and recruitment fit for purpose to support prosecutors in liaising with witnesses and victims.
- Utilising digital platforms and innovative methods of payment of witness allowance.

Budget

The five-year Strategic Plan for the Office of the Director of Public Prosecutions (ODPP) has been projected to cost \$66.2 million. The primary source of funding for this plan will come from the Government of Fiji, with financial oversight ensured through the submission of Annual Reports. This comprehensive budget aims to support the various strategic initiatives outlined in the plan, ensuring that the ODPP can effectively fulfil its mandate.

One of the most significant expenses not included in the current budget is the development of the National Prosecution Services. This new prosecutorial structure and facility is envisioned to accommodate all prosecutors, streamline operations, and reduce reliance on Police Prosecution services.

The ODPP acknowledges that the successful implementation of its strategic priorities is contingent upon government priorities and the availability of funds. External factors, such as economic fluctuations and unforeseen events like the COVID-19 pandemic, can impact budget allocations. These challenges underscore the importance of flexible and adaptive planning to ensure the continuity of essential services.

Despite these potential hurdles, the ODPP remains optimistic about its ability to deliver effective and efficient prosecution services.
